The Ten Most Endangered Historic Properties for 2015

The 2015 Ten Most Endangered Historic Properties were announced on August 6, 2015, at a reception in Anchorage by the Alaska Association for Historic Preservation (AAHP). Property owners submitting nominations may apply for a Ten Most Endangered Historic Properties grant, which provides seed money for preservation activities for the property. This year's deadline for applications is October 15. Please check the AAHP website at http://www.aahp-online.net/ for more details. The recipient will be announced at the AAHP Annual Meeting on November 2.

Ipiutak Archaeological District, Point Hope

The Ipiutak Archaeological District encompasses the Point Hope peninsula, which extends 15 miles into the Chukchi Sea. The district contains four site areas dating as far back as 400 A.D. The district is being rapidly eroded along the north coast by tidal currents.

Celebrate Swedish Holidays at the Oscar Anderson House Museum December 5th & 6th and 12th &13th, 2015

Special St. Lucia Day Celebration on December 13th

You are invited to join AAHP volunteers, members, and board members for a Swedish-themed holiday during the first two weekends of December.

The Oscar Anderson House Museum, located at 420 M Street (in Elderberry Park), will be decorated by longtime museum caretaker, Mary Flaherty, in the Swedish tradition. Visitors will be able to "step back in time" to Christmas in early Anchorage with special volunteer-led 40 minute holiday tours that will run continuously from noon -4 pm each day.

Swedish-style treats of the season and traditional activities will also be shared with visitors. A special activity will take place on Sunday, December 13, which is St. Lucia Day. Each year, this festival of light is traditionally observed in Sweden and other countries, with a focus on hospitality, sharing, and caring for others. Young girls dress as St. Lucia in a white dress with red sash and a wreath of candles on her head. St. Lucia may be attended by Star Boy.

Our celebration of St. Lucia Day is recognized by the Municipality of Anchorage as a Centennial Event. Historic Preservation Award Nominations Are Now Open

Nominations are now open for the Eighth Annual AAHP Historic Preservation Award. Given every year since 2007, this award recognizes a project, organization, agency, or individual exemplifying the highest standards among Alaska preservation efforts. Nominations are encouraged from both individuals and organizations. The deadline to submit nominations is October 15, 2015, and the winner will be announced at the AAHP Annual Meeting on November 2, 2015.

Last year, AAHP presented awards in two categories — Individual Stewardship and Lifetime Achievement. Jim Renkert was honored for excellence in historic preservation in Alaska by an individual for his exemplary leadership of the Friends of Nike Site Summit restoration of the Cold War Nike Hercules missile site since 2008. Thad Poulson was recognized for his lifetime achievement in historic preservation in Alaska, as for more than 30 years, he has been at the forefront of the restoration of many historic buildings in Sitka.

Kake Cannery National Historic Landmark, Kake

One of the 134 salmon canneries built in Southeast Alaska between 1878 and 1949, the Salmon Cannery, begun in 1906 by Kake Trading & Packing Company, was Kake's first industrial development.



Hi-yu Mine, Fairbanks

The Hi-yu Mine was in operation in the Fairbanks Mining District from 1912-1930, and was the highest capacity mill operating in the district. The mining site is in danger from vandalism and neglect.



Dexter's Roadhouse, Golovin

Dexter's Roadhouse was established in the late 1890s as a rest station on the Iditarod Trail. The original section was constructed using California redwood. Deemed historically significant in the 1980s, it is suffering from climate factors and neglect.



4th Avenue Theatre, Anchorage

A prominent Art Deco style landmark located in the heart of downtown Anchorage, this theater was completed in 1947. It is significant for its association with Austin "Cap" Lathrop and as the best example of Art Deco style in Alaska. The theatre is endangered by potential demolition for high-rise development.



Igloo Hotel, Cantwell

Designed and built by Leon Smith, this is a rare example of Alaska roadside architecture. Construction began in the early 1970s. It was designed to have a 4-story atrium, 48 rooms, dining room, kitchen, gift shop, offices, and additional bedrooms. Set to be completed in 1992, it remains unfinished and is threatened by continued neglect.

Historic Old Bering Hill Chapel, Adak

Built in 1944 by the Army Engineers, the chapel was moved to its present location by the Seabees and Navy Public Works Department civilians in 1953. When the new chapel was built, it was scheduled for demolition, but instead sat deteriorating until restoration efforts in the 1990s.



Ole Dahl Cabin #1, Talkeetna

Built in 1916, this cabin is the first of two buildings built by Norwegian immigrant, Ole Dahl. It is one of two original buildings still standing in Talkeetna. It was moved across the street from its original location in the 1970s.



Buckner Building, Whittier

The Buckner Building was constructed in 1952 as a "city under one roof" for use by the military. It is the only American Army building of its kind in the world and is in danger from vandalism and neglect.



Alaska Railroad Montana Station Water Tower, Montana Creek

This structure was the original Alaska Railroad water tower at Montana Station, used to service steam engines. It was moved to its current location in 1957/1958. It is the last standing Alaska Railroad water tower of this type.

Oscar Anderson House Museum 2015 in Review

In 2015, the Oscar Anderson House Museum was open daily except Mondays from May 26 to September 4. In 82 days of operation, more than 540 visitors stepped back in time to take a guided tour to glimpse what life was like in early Anchorage. Since 2012, AAHP has managed the operations of the House Museum for the Municipality of Anchorage. This summer saw the highest seasonal visitation we have recorded.

In honor of the Anchorage Centennial, and in agreement with the Municipality, this year AAHP offered a special reduced admission price to Anchorage residents. Almost half (248) of the 2015 visitors were Anchorage-ites, who joined us either for the first time or who came back after an absence of many years. In prior years, most of our visitors were out-of-town tourists rather than locals enjoying the historical treasure so close to home. We were gratified that so many Anchorage residents came to visit.

Please note that your AAHP membership entitles you to free admission to the Oscar Anderson House Museum during the summer season. The Museum is open for guided tours starting the day after Memorial Day and running through the Friday before Labor Day.

Nike Site Summit Tours for 2015



A FONSS tour bus descends to the Lower Site at Nike Site Summit. The Upper Site and Lower Site are separated by 1,000 feet in elevation. Nike Site Summit is located on Joint Base Elmendorf Richardson (JBER) in the Chugach Mountains near Arctic Valley.

First offered by Friends of Nike Site Summit (FONSS) in 2012, the Nike Site Summit public tours continued in 2015 with seven totally subscribed public tours (350 people). A special midsummer dinner and evening tour was also fully subscribed; net proceeds from that benefit helped fund the stabilization work on the Launch Control Building this year.

Nike Site Summit was one of three Nike-Hercules installations protecting Anchorage during the Cold War. Site Summit was decommissioned in 1979 and is one of only three substantially intact Nike installations that remain in the U.S. In 2009, under agreement with Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson (JBER), FONSS was provided the opportunity to stabilize six buildings and save them from demolition.

This tour season, Nike Site Summit veterans and other FONSS volunteers highlighted the stabilization completed on these six

structures at Site Summit. 2015 work, funded primarily by the Rasmuson Foundation, the Atwood Foundation, and dozens of individuals and other private donors, focused on the last of these, the Launch Control Building. Other featured buildings on the tour were the previously completed Sentry Stations and Dog Kennels.

All these buildings are being stabilized to preserve Site Summit as a monument to Cold War veterans and to educate present and future generations about the Cold War. More information about Nike Site Summit is available on the FONSS website at http://www.nikesitesummit.net/.
